

In the age of inquiry-based learning, how do we create a learning environment where students are re-thinking rather than re-telling? In this session, BC teacher and author Adrienne Gear will share and explore the concept of inquiry through the lens of her *Reading Power* approach. She will share many examples of lessons and units centered around deep thinking and learning in all subject areas.
