

Jessica will tie in the connection to nature at each site, which you can adapt for your own classroom. Bring lunch, water and be prepared for the weather.

C.8 Numeracy vs Mathematics

Who needs to be numerate? The Government of Canada claims that, "The modern economy requires numeracy skills" and "[Numeracy] remains critical to functioning in today's society." Numeracy is assessed in grade 10, and educators express concern about the "numeracy gap". Yet, there is no required level of numeracy for high school graduation and many folks happily admit to being no good with numbers. So what is numeracy, really, and what does it have to do with mathematics? In this workshop, we will discuss the relationship between mathematics and numeracy, in particular, exploring where these areas overlap and differ from one another. We will examine the ways in which the mathematics curriculum supports the development of students' numeracy, and work collaboratively to develop practical tools and problem sets for teachers to use in their classrooms to encourage and assess numeracy within the context of that curriculum. We will uncover opportunities to increase student engagement with numeracy and share some strategies to expand students' appetites for effectively interpreting and working with quantitative information. Join us to share your thoughts, experiences, questions and frustrations as we wrestle together with this hot topic.
